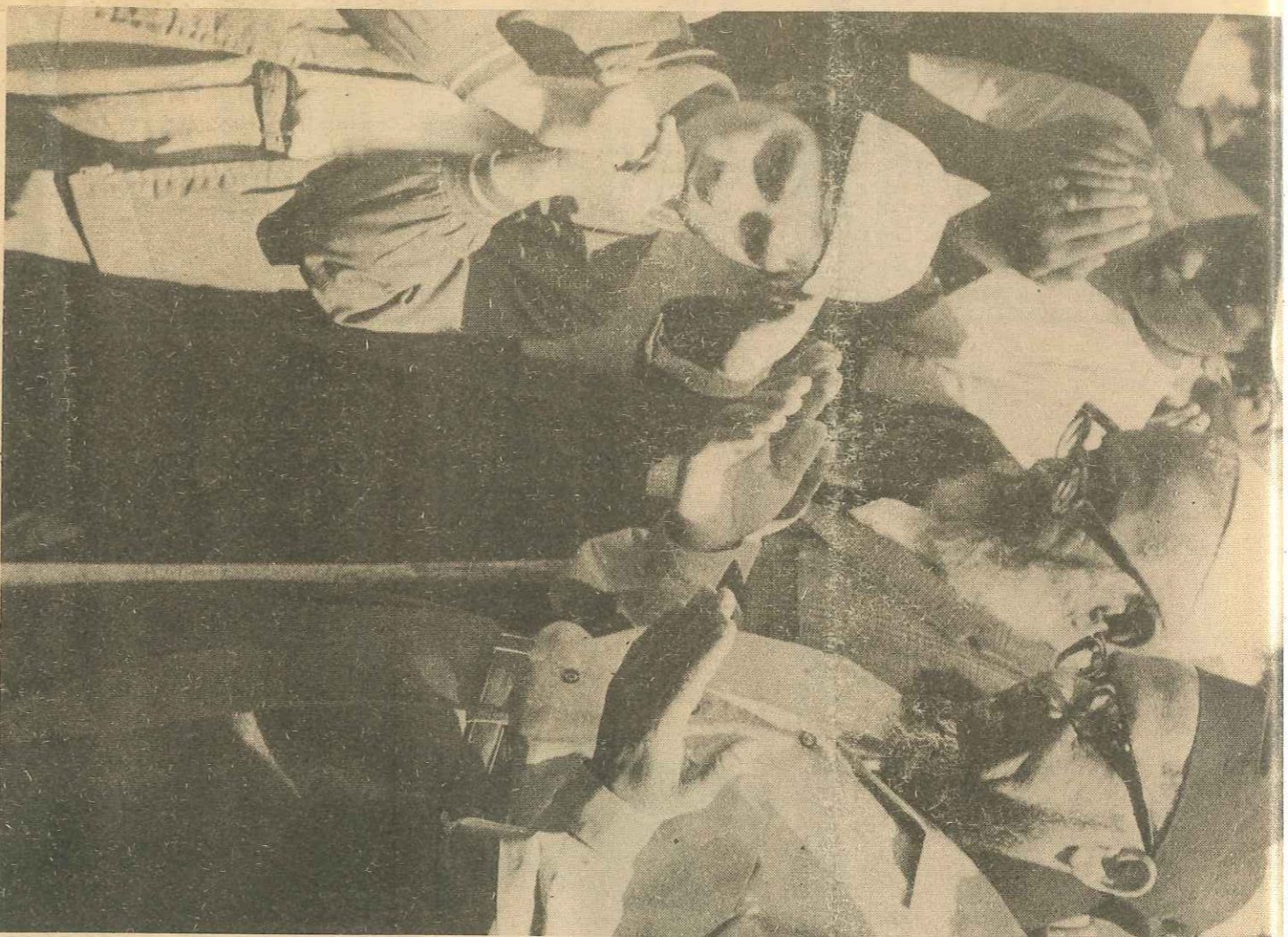
CAPE TOWN. — The Rev. Bernard Wrankmore will be back at work at the Mission to Seamen Institute today, a friend said yesterday.
