This was revealed today in the Johannesburg Magistrate's Court at the resumption of the inquest, presided over by Mr J. J. L. de Villiers, assisted by Dr I. W. Simpson, a pathologist pathologist.

Mr de Villiers said he wished to place on record that on December I last year, when the inquest was originally scheduled to begin, Mr I. A. Maisels, QC, assisted by Mr G. Bizos (representing the Ti molfamily), requested access to documents that had been placed before the court.

This request was refused, and the matter taken to the Supreme Court where judgment in favour of the Timolfamily was delivered on January 28

"Subsequently, I had the opportunity of perusing all the opportunity of perusing all the documents, and after discussing the matter with Mr Maisels and the police, I decided which documents would be relevant to the inquest, and it is these that I propose using," Mr de Villiers said.

If added: "I had decided also to make all these documents available to the Timol family, their counsel, and all ing the Press."

affidavits of certain witnesses being read to the court without the people in question being called as witnesses.

"These are a Constable Thinnish, of Newlands police station, Warrant Officer N. Els, Mr Khan, believed to be an undertaker. Mr Fas, Mr Mostert, Mr Fourie. Mr le Roux and Mr du Preez. There may be others whom it would not be necessary to call as the inquest proceeds," Mr Maisels submitted.

Mr de Villiers said he felt the inspection applied for must be held before evidence was led, and agreed that it would be a good thing that the two doctors be allowed to compare findings. He also agreed that if counsel for the Timol family felt it unnecessary to call ceritain witnesses, their affidavits would be sufficient for the purpose of the inquest.

All S. A. Cilliers, instructed by the attorney general on behalf of the South African Police, intimated that he, too, had no objection to the witnesses named not being called. The magistrate, Mr Bizos, Mr P. A. Z. Kotze, Mr A. Beukes, Major General C. A. Buys, South Africa's CID chief and other senior officers, made the inspection in loco at John Vorster Square.

The court and legal representatives inspected the spot where Mr Timol was questioned by the police.

Mr Yousuf Timol (65) and his wife, Hawa (53), parents of the dead man, were allowed to see the place where their son was questioned.
