# Now banned mother loses her job as well

**SHEILA WEINBERG**, banned and placed under house arrest for five years last week, has lost her job.

Miss Weinberg (31), the secretary of the Human Rights Committee, worked for a correspondence college. Now she is prohibited from entering premises involved in education or publishing.

Her small son Mark will also suffer because of the restriction orders imposed on his mother.

A friend said: "Sheila is prohibited from having visitors, so friends cannot take their children round to play with Mark."

Miss Weinberg's mother, Mrs Violet Weinberg, is also banned but has had special permission to communicate with her daughter. Her father, Mr

Eli Weinberg, was banned but fled South Africa at the beginning of September.

In the order served on Miss Weinberg, the Minister of Justice, Mr Jimmy Kruger, states: "I am satisfied you engage in ac-

tivities which endanger or are calculated to endanger the maintenance of public order."

Miss Weinberg is specifically prohibited from having dealings with the Human Rights Committee a group which bases its programme on the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights.

Yesterday the committee issued a statement denouncing the "arbitrary action" against its secretary and also the continued detention under the Internal Security Act, of its chairman, Mr Mohammed Timol, who has been in custody for almost three months.

The statement warned the Government to release all political prisoners and detainees if South Africa is to escape further bloodshed.

# Indress Naidoo quits SA

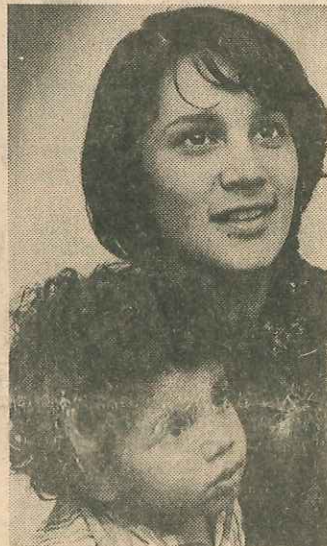
**MR Indress Naidoo**, a former Robben Island prisoner banned and house arrested immediately after his release three years ago, has fled the country for Swaziland.

Mr Naidoo, 38, was sentenced to 10 years in jail in 1963 after being found guilty with two other men of blowing up a railway toolshed near Johannesburg, and attempting to blow up a signal relay case.

He was last seen on Sunday shortly after lunch, but telephoned his wife, Mrs Saeeda Naidoo, from Swaziland on Monday evening.

"He sounded very well, but I've no idea why he left or what he will be doing. I don't even know if he's still in Swaziland," she said yesterday.

Meanwhile the banned Cape Town journalist, Mr Eric Abraham, who fled South Africa on Tuesday, will leave Botswana for England on Saturday on British travel documents. This was confirmed from Gaborone by Mr Craig Williamson, the former Nusas vice-president, who skipped the country earlier this week.
