He said that despite this, the results of scientific research in South Africa was very gratifying.

Prof. Steffen arrived in the Republic two weeks ago to attend the annual congress of the International Union of Biological Sciences of which he is vice-president.

According to Prof. Steffen, scientists in South Africa suffered from geographical isolation. Scientists should be allowed to travel unrestricted.

He also expressed the opinion that scientists should come forward in a definite attempt to reach the public through news media, thus influencing them to the advantage of education.

Population pressure was, in his mind, the greatest single factor in the deterioration of the environment.

"Education, in my mind, is the key to population control. Yet the problem is now of a social and political nature. National science has provided, all the means of population control but the matter is not longer in the hands of scientists," he said.

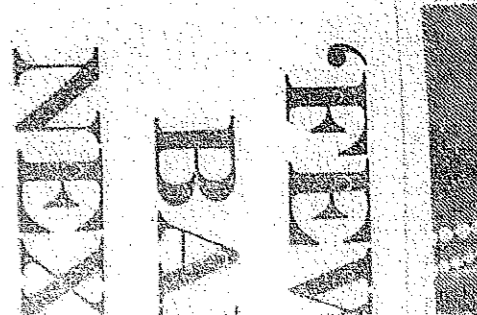

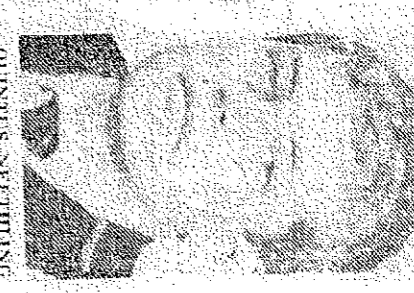

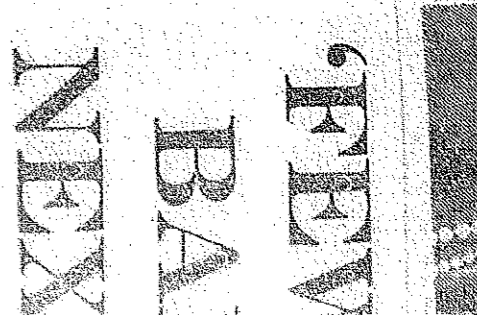
