A FULL INVESTIGATION into the case of Mr
Mohamed Essop, the detained student, should be
held, Mr Justice Margo said in the Supreme Court

Mr Justice Margo said the respondents should be entitled to vindicate themselves and the fears of the public should be set at rest.

The Judge was presiding at the hearing of an urgent application in which Mr Ismail Essop, the students father, sought relief for his son from the first respondent, and Colonel Greyling of the Security Police, the second respondent. Mr Mohamed Essop was arrested by the Security Folice in Judge granted a temporary interdict restraining the police from assaulting, interrogating in any manner other than that prescribed by the Jaw, or from exerting any undue pressure on Mr Essop. He further ordered that the interdict serve as a rule missi returnable on December 7. On that day the matron in charge of the Cassim Adam ward at Pretoria's H. F. Verwoerd Hospital must be at the hearing. The matron, according to papers before the court, denied to Mr Ismail Essop that his son was in the ward while, in fact, he was there.

Both parties are also entitled to call further witnesses on December 7, provided they file adequate intention of doing so. The Judge stressed that his single of facts for or against the applicant, but was merely a procedural step which would preserve the rights of the individual pending an investigation.

Before he reached this conclusion, the judge said from
the conflicting affidavits before the court he could not
determine what the origins of
the matter were or the substance of the fears expressed
by the applicant.

He pointed out tha there
was prima facie evidence of injuries to the student which
had been strongly refuted.

What had impressed him,
however, was the evidence of
the actions of the matron of
the Cassim Adam ward. It was
an elementary matter of decency, for her to tell MT Essop,
senior, that his son was in the
ward, to explain she was uninformation, and then to refer
him to the proper authorities.
Instead she had denied the
student was in the ward.

to indicate that all is not well,"

THE Commissioner of Police, General Gideon Joubert, confirmed today that no outsider would be permitted to see Mr Mohamed Essop, the Security Police detainee, in the Pretoria prison hospital.

Asked whether any independent doctors would be allowed to examine the detainee, as in the Pretoria Supreme Court on Friday. General Joubert said: "For the present nobody will be permitted to see him." He added that Mr Essop was Security Police, but had not done so.

"I have no evidence whatsoever that Mr Essop was treated
unreasonably or was assaulted.
But if he submits a charge of
assault, this will be dealt with
in the customary manner and
presented to the Attorney
General or his representa-

As far as he was concerned, there was "nothing the matter" with Mr Essop apart from what emerged from medical evidence which was placed before Mr Justice Margo on Friday.

About the investigation into the circumstances surrounding the death of Mr Ahmed Timol, General Joubert said: "The investigation is being expedited to allow an inquest at the earliest opportunity."

He confirmed that the head of the CID, Major General C. A. Buys, was in charge of the investigation, but would not say what facts had emerged so far.
