Bishop: No equal pay

DURBAN. — The Bishop of Zululand, the Rt. Rev. Alpheus Zulu, has become "more strongly convinced" since his visit to the United States that he should oppose the current agitation for equal pay for Black and White clergy in South Africa.

In his monthly newsletter, Bishop Zulu says he holds this view particularly in the light of the fact that practically speaking, equal pay meant that African clergymen in charge of African congregations would have an "undue proportion" of their stipends contributed by White congregations.

The Bishop's remarks come at a time when more and more Churches are moving towards equal stipends for all their ministers.

WELFARE

However, he says the African clergymen will only start to be seriously concerned for the welfare of the Black people when they suffer with them by identifying with them where they are.

"Otherwise, why did God become man in Jesus Christ? It is good for White congregations to assist Black ones. But White congregations must not deprive Black congregations of their great privilege.

"If anyone disputes this view, I challenge him to tell me what Black clergymen as a body are doing in their struggle to express their concern for Black communities in daily living."

Ship returns

CAPE TOWN. — The University of Cape Town's oceanographic research ship, the Thomas R. Davis, returned yesterday from her longest voyage to date, a 5 015 sea-mile trip to the Comoro islands in the Mozambique Channel. — Sapa.

They were arrested in Johannesburg last week. A spokesman for the British Consulate-General in Johannesburg confirmed yesterday that the British Ambassador, Sir Arthur Snelling, had visited Dr. Muller in Pretoria to make the request.

Dr. Muller received a similar visit from the Australian Ambassador, Mr. T. W. Cutts.

He undertook to give both diplomats replies "after looking into the request".

No direct representations have yet been made to Dr. Muller in connection with the German detainee, Mr. Jurgen Wagner.

Sapa-AP reported from London yesterday that the Foreign Office, in a statement issued at a daily news conference said: "The British Government expects, as is customary, to be allowed consular access to the two men who have been detained."

PAMPHLETS

Yesterday two University of the Witwatersrand student leaders were held briefly by police while they were distributing pamphlets advertising a meeting today to protest against detention without trial.

They are Mr. Glen Moss, vice-president of the Students' Representative Council, and Mr. Taffy Adler, former president of the SRC.

Both students were taken to John Vorster Square police headquarters after police had questioned them outside St. Mary's Anglican Cathedral where they had been handing out the pamphlets.

A Security Police officer at John Vorster Square confiscated the pamphlets before releasing the students.

The public meeting, organised by University of the Witwatersrand students, will be held at 1.15 pm today at the Barrage Hall in Johannesburg.

It will be addressed by the Transvaal leader of the Labour Party, Mr. Miley Richards, and Professor Phillip Tobias, professor of anatomy at Wits.

BUSINESSES

About 200 people attended lunch-hour services in Johannesburg yesterday to express concern at the death of Mr. Ahmed Timol. The services were held at St. Mary's Anglican Cathedral, the Trinity Congregational Church, Braamfontein, and at the United Congregational Church.

Prayer meetings in memory of Mr. Timol and for political prisoners, are to be held in Johannesburg tomorrow.

Business in the non-White sector of Durban and in many

parts of Natal is likely to come to a standstill for the last hour of business tomorrow in response to a Natal Indian Congress call for a show of sympathy with the outcry against the recent Security Police raids and Mr. Timol's death.

After a multi-racial protest meeting in the Durban City Hall tonight, at least 11 more protest meetings have been arranged by the Natal Indian Congress for tomorrow. Two of them will be addressed by the Rev. Bernard Wrangmore.

The day of mourning will also be observed in Maritzburg tomorrow.

A prayer meeting will be held at which the speakers will include the Very Rev. W. L. Wellington, Dean of St. Saviour's Anglican Cathedral.
