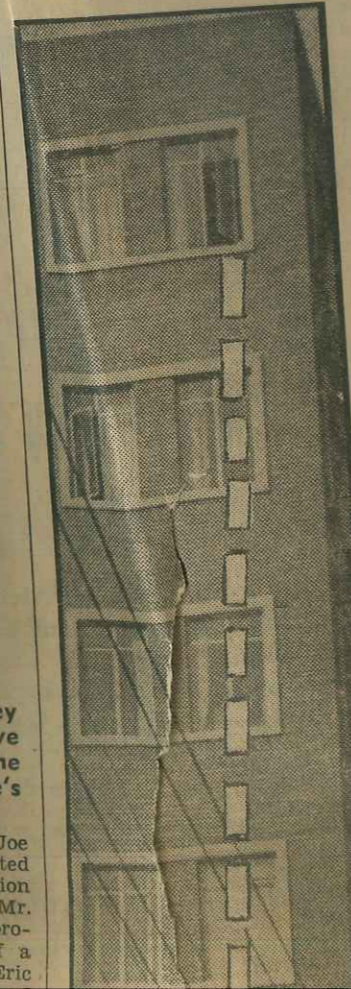

Seven-floor leap



90-day man dies in jump from Grays window

A 32-YEAR-OLD Indian attorney's clerk, Suliman Saloojee, who was detained under the 90-day clause 65 days ago, jumped to his death from the seventh floor of Johannesburg police headquarters at The Grays yesterday afternoon while he was being interrogated by Security Branch detectives.

Bearded Mr. Saloojee fell on a parapet outside the first floor offices overlooking Von Wielligh Street. He suffered back and leg injuries and died on the way to hospital.

Banda in control—even the rebels back him

ZOMBA.—The political crisis in Malawi looks to be over—at least for the time being.

The National Assembly gave the Prime Minister, Dr. Banda, a unanimous vote of confidence here last night.

The six Cabinet Ministers who were either sacked by Dr. Banda or who resigned voted with the rest of the 53-man National Assembly.

There were wild scenes of jubilation outside the Parliament buildings when Dr. Banda emerged after his 12-hour battle to retain leadership.

Men and women sang and danced in the street as he appeared waving his flywhisk and beaming broadly.

A large section of the crowd gave the same acclaim to the six rebel ministers as they left and hundreds of Africans ran after their cars as they drove home.

WINDING UP

Dr. Banda wound up the debate by facing the Speaker's table and shouting: "I do not do anything under duress—I would rather be dead."

He continually stamped up and down the floor of the Chamber waving his flywhisk down with either one or two hands and picked up again to emphasize

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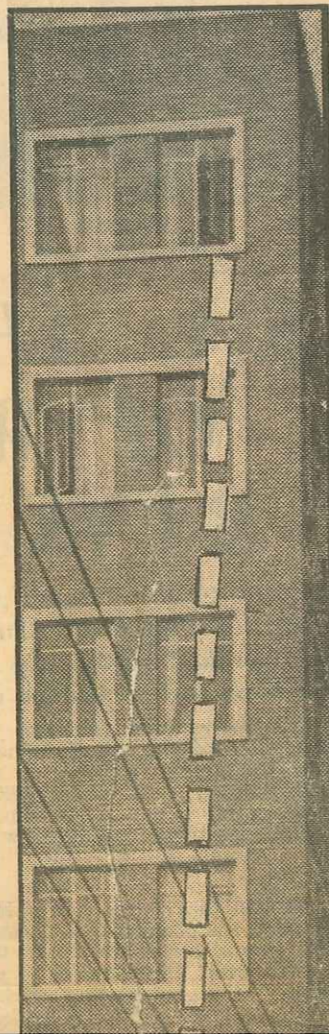
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Merchant alleges council revenge

AN African merchant alleged a "conspiracy" of revenge against him by officials of the Carletonville Town Council in an urgent application brought before a judge in Johannesburg last night.

Among the allegations made by Mr. Booker T. Washington Nyokana in his petition to Mr. Justice Vieira were:

- Threats by officials to get him out of the Khutsong location of Carletonville and to stop his business.

- Removal from his position as chairman of the local school committee.

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A 14-year-old schoolboy, David van Dyk of Main Street, Fairview, Johannesburg, told me: "I saw a tall Indian stand for a second in the end window on the seventh floor of The Grays. Then he jumped. A moment later three heads popped out of the window."

ON STRETCHER

Captain T. J. Swanepoel and two detectives ran down the stairs and on to the parapet where the Indian lay his eyes open.

Within minutes a fire engine arrived. Firemen strapped the dying man to a stretcher and lowered him to the street.

"I climbed to the parapet. All three detectives looked upset. I asked Captain Swanepoel what had happened. He replied: "I don't know."

As Mr. Saloojee was lowered down the ladder, a crowd—mostly Africans—gathered round
