GENERAL:

Dr Steve R Naidoo is a specialist forensic pathologist in Durban, South Africa, and had been Associate Professor and Head of the Department of Forensic Medicine at the Nelson R.Mandela School of Medicine of the University of Natal, Durban, South Africa from 2003, and is now in independent practice. He has had, at 2012, approximately 29 years of experience in forensic pathology service for the state, and in teaching at university level for the last 20 years.

Whilst always having had an interest in Osteology and human skeletal remains, he was drawn to the work of Truth Commission in South Africa by default, called to assist in KZN of the remains of those activists that had died under detention or after or after strange disappearances during the apartheid era. He was, for three years invited by the United Nations ICTY (International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia) (2000, 2001), and UNMIK (United Nations Mission in Kosovo) (2002) to assist with exhumations and examinations of the remains of those that had perished in the recent past conflict. Whilst providing an opportunity to meet with forensic experts from other parts of the world, it has given insight into the challenges and opportunities that this kind of humanitarian work holds. He was appointed chairman of a Board of Medical Examiners in Kosovo in 2003 to coordinate and conduct a proficiency examination for forensic medical officers.

As part of his university responsibilities, he taught a full undergraduate course in forensic medicine for medical students, a postgraduate course in forensic pathology for residents, and an adjunct course in forensic medicine for legal students at Masters level (LLM). As part of social responsibility in university service, he started (and successfully ran over six years) a non-specialist postgraduate qualification (Postgraduate Diploma in Forensic Health Care) at the university, intended to serve as a conduit for postgraduate training of those clinical forensic medical practitioners (both doctors and nurses) currently undertaking clinical forensic medical examinations of patients who have experienced trauma, sexual abuse and rape, and also for those undertaking medico-legal/forensic autopsy examinations.

His special interests include general forensic traumatology, forensic anatomy, forensic anthropology/osteology, paediatric forensic pathology and forensic neuropathology, and quality assurance in forensic medicine. He also has an interest in supporting and furthering the cause of clinical forensic medicine, particularly sexual assault and child abuse.

He chaired (2009-2011) the national specialist committee in forensic pathology for the SA government. Steve is a regular speaker at national and international professional events, and also spends time participating in local medical practitioner (general practice and specialist) continued professional development programmes.

He was the founding chairperson of the African Network (now Society) of Forensic Medicine (ASFM), developed with collaboration with the Victorian Institute of Forensic Medicine (VIFM - Monash University) and the Australian Federal Police (AFP).

In his independent practice, apart from his consultations, Steve is involved in starting a Forensic Medicine Clinical Reference Group with his clinical forensic colleagues in KZN, and continues to train law and medical students in a part-time capacity.

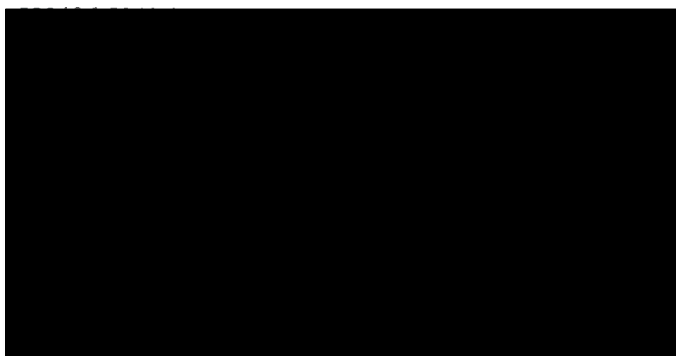

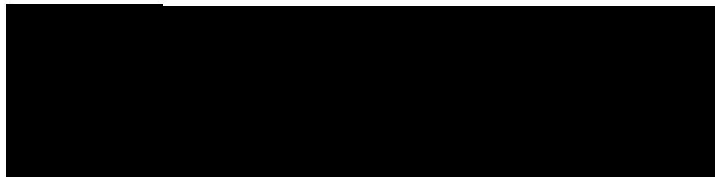
